
Budget 2012

THE PASTOR'S PEN

Dear Friends in Christ,

I enjoy shopping for trees from the Soil and Water order every year. As we think about ordering trees for our yard, questions need to be answered: what do we want it to look like, what are the trees for, how many? We plant the seedlings expecting them to grow but some do better than others. Planting seedlings struck me as an apt analogy for where we are at as a church. We have been given a past 7 months to ask all these questions about our life together: what do we want to do with this or that? What are we expecting to need? How do we want our ministry to look like? What is the need? What are the conditions we are we planting in? It excites me that we are asking questions. One attitude that I haven't heard is indifference. When I worked as a carpenter, guys would ask: how does this look? To which someone would always reply: It'll look great from my house. Some people in the community are there right now. They are asking what difference does it make? And they are correct from their frame of reference. It doesn't make any difference without hope. And, as we know, our only hope is the Lord.

Lord.

So I return to the tree questions: what are we planting for? What type of context are we planting in? Do we plant for quick growth? Do we plant for quick growth? Do we plant for stable and healthy growth? Do we plant at all?

An often misappropriated Tolkien poem in Lord of the Rings says:

All that is gold does not glitter,

Not all those who wander are lost;

The old that is strong does not wither,

Deep roots are not reached by the frost.

From the ashes a fire shall be woken,

A light from the shadows shall spring;

Renewed shall be blade that was broken,

The crownless again shall be king.

<u>Not all those who wander are</u> <u>lost</u> is a popular bumper sticker. When I see that I can't help but think: but some are. So, I am going to misapply this too: "The old that is strong does not wither/ Deep roots are not reached by the frost". Some old is not strong. But old and strong, this is not easily uprooted. These past months have tested our strength and hope. It has tested what is just old and we've seen what is not easily uprooted.

Personally, this has been a challenge and taxing. I am sorry where I have failed you and said the wrong thing. I will not give up my task to witness to the Gospel in all aspects of our life together. And yet, I am human- some of you have seen that all too well. We all know that people talk about how the pastor is wrongbut we can't *tell him*. That's fine. (I am speaking of those *other* churches, of course.) Thank you for practicing grace.

The Gospel in this is that we are God's people together- a body made up of many parts, being knit together in love, so that we all can be released to do works of service, so that we all may be built up until we all know Christ fully. I am looking forward to how we are planting week in and week out, anticipating God's Kingdom come in this place.

FOOD PANTRY REPORT

The Middleburgh Ecumenical Food Pantry is housed in our church and staffed by volunteers from the local churches and civic organizations. In addition people from these churches and civic organizations donate food supplies and money to help keep the food pantry stocked.

This past year has been quite unique in the history of the food pantry. From April 2011 thru August 2011 the food pantry operated normally serving 318 people who reside in the Middleburgh School District. As we all know Hurricane Irene destroyed most everything in her path including our church facilities which included the food pantry. Thus the food pantry was closed from September 2011 through January 2012.

The recovery process was amazing. Our church took the responsibility of repairing the physical plant. Volunteers cleaned and reinstalled the shelves. Monetary donations from individuals and groups, plus grants from the RCA and the Regional Food Bank allowed us to re-stock the shelves. The food pantry re-opened February 15th, and since that time over 54 people have been served from the food pantry through March 17.

The food pantry is open Wednesdays, 4 -6, and Saturdays, 9 -11. The food pantry is in constant need of restocking so any donations of nonperishable food supplies are appreciated. <u>Volunteers</u> <u>are still needed to fill in Saturday times.</u> The volunteers from the food pantry are very grateful to the Reformed Church for sharing space for our mission to serve our community.

SANCTUARY REPORT

The Sanctuary Committee began meeting in November to address the needs of our Sanctuary in the recovery process. The committee is led by Joan Youmans, chairperson, and Jim Spencer, meeting moderator. Jim Snyder is the liaison of the committee communicating directly with contractors and engineers. Dimensions North Ltd, of Catskill has been hired as the lead contractor for this work. Structural engineers have assessed damage and areas of need and concern in the sanctuary, and those areas have been reviewed with the committee. Currently, work is focused on getting ready to lay a new floor for the sanctuary, with emphasis on the basement area for concrete work and setting steel support beams. The committee has forwarded a recommendation to consistory for a timber framed, tung and groove floor of Douglas Fir. After reviewing a number of options for this work, the committee felt this option to be the best in assuring a firm, withstanding floor for the sanctuary. The committee is continuing its work concentrating on a design for the front of the church. Additional areas to be addressed will be the balcony, pews, heating, sound system to name but a few on the list. Certainly, the committee if focused on decisions that will not only be the best for our worship area, but decisions to be fiscally responsible for the congregation. The committee is grateful for the variety of talents and commitments each member brings to the group, and they pray for God's guidance and wisdom to steer their work.

As the figures indicate, as a congregation we have done a truly remarkable job of controlling our operating expenses: over the past nine years our expenses have actually *declined* by almost 3%, while the cost of living *rose* by 22%. However during the same period, our plate receipts and pledges have fallen by almost 14%. Consequently, except for two years, expenses have exceeded receipts, resulting in periodic withdrawals from our limited savings and investments.

And, needless to say, we are also confronted with the challenge of repairing the substantial damage caused by Hurricane Irene.

However, setting aside for a moment our current budgetary concerns, over time, our giving should be at a level that is sufficient to support the overall mission of the Church – which is to be Jesus' representatives in our community, and beyond.

We are by nature a generous congregation; and moreover, we have been faithful stewards of the financial resources that we have been blessed with. But it is strictly up to each of us individually to prayerfully determine what God wants us to give to sustain the mission of Middleburgh Reformed Church.

The decision to give, and what way we give, is one not to be taken lightly. The prayerful consideration of our giving decisions is critical to our growth as Disciples of Christ.
