As we look to celebrate the birth of Baby Jesus, let us join hands of joy in our Sanctuary, December 2, 2012. From all of us at the Middleburgh Reformed Church, we wish you a very MERRY CHRISTMAS!



The Sanctuary Committee met on Tuesday November 20, to continue finishing work on the Sanctuary, which tentatively will reopen to worshippers on December 2. Work is quickly finishing for a return to this area, after being closed since the August 2011 effects of Hurricane Irene. The committee was updated on completions of lighting, heating and a new sound system. The committee continues its search for pews with some leads on pews that will both be comfortable for worshippers and also compliment the interior. Until then, we will temporarily use chairs. Other furniture needs being addressed include pieces for the front presentation area. The communion table, the main focal point of the sanctuary, reminding us of our communion with Christ in the sanctuary, will be a keepsake for the congregation, as it is being constructed from the original chestnut flooring of our 1786 building. Its style will be reminiscent of this 1786 time period. And the last area for our attention the balcony, soon to be open. We are thankful to God for guidance and encouragement during this process, and to all for gifts of time and resources supporting completion of our worship area.

This fall we participated in a number of OCC events. On Halloween afternoon, members of the youth group met to bag candy, bag hair accessories, make beaded bracelets, and make friendship bracelets. On Nov. 2, several of the "older set" gathered to assemble GO boxes and prepack school supplies and toiletries. Following worship on Nov. 4, the church family enjoyed lunch together followed by a packing party. We packed 250 shoe boxes, the most we have ever done at our packing party! The following Sunday was dedication Sunday when Pastor Jeff led us in a blessing over the boxes. We hosted a shoe box drop-off site during national collection week.

Thank you to everyone who has supported OCC in 2012. We look forward to your continued participation in this outreach to the world's hurting children. We ask for your prayers as we go into 2013. OCC will be celebrating its 20th anniversary as the one hundred millionth shoe box gift will be placed in a child's hands!

FOOD PANTRY Continues to Serve

The Middleburgh Ecumenical Food Pantry housed in our Fellowship Hall continues to serve people in Middleburgh who are in need. The month of September saw us help 21 households for a total of 89 people. The month of October saw 20 households for a total of 60 people.

Your support through food supplies, money and volunteer work at the pantry is greatly appreciated. We are able to keep the food pantry open every Wednesday from 4 to 6, and every Saturday from 9 to 11. Our clients are walk in and the volunteers supply them with food according to the number of people in the household.

Non perishable food items are always accepted. You may leave them by the door to the pantry. All help is appreciated.

Musings About Christian Stewardship and Young People

"Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old they will not turn from it."

- Proverbs 22:6 (NIV)

Recently, while searching for a definition of stewardship that young folks might relate to, I came across the following from the National Council of Churches United Stewardship Council: "Christian stewardship is the practice of systematic and proportionate giving of time, abilities, and material possessions, based upon the conviction that these are trusts from God to be used in his service for the benefit of all mankind in grateful acknowledgment of Christ's redeeming love." This concise definition sums up Christian stewardship rather well, but it might take a bit of unpacking for it to be really useful and relevant for young people...

For further guidance, I turned to Robert Fulghum, the author of "All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten". In his book, Fulghum reveals that "Most of what I really need to know about how to live and what to do and how to be I learned in kindergarten. Wisdom was not at the top of the graduate school mountain, but there in the sandpile at Sunday school." Fulghum then lists fourteen things he learned in kindergarten, the first one being: "Share everything."

A bit of browsing on the Internet, and I also discovered that with children, "Generosity boils down to sharing." These observations about sharing brought to mind_the_little_cardboard



"Mite" boxes from the church of my childhood. Once a year, each Sunday school child was given a Mite box. The expectation was that we would make a cheerful sacrifice by filling them up with pennies. (This was in the days when a nickel would buy a Hershey bar!) Several weeks later, the Mite boxes would be collected in a special offering, and the money contributed would be given to a worthy cause.

Our gratitude is another aspect of stewardship. Lewis Smedes, a theologian and author, emphasizes the importance of teaching children to be grateful for God's many gifts in his <u>Days of Grace Through the Year</u>, saying:

"I do not understand how people can be thankful for a gift if they have no person to thank for giving it to them. We teach our children to say thank-you to their grandmother for her birthday gift; why should we not teach them to say thank-you to God for the gift of their birth? Why should we not teach them that every new dawn of every new morning, every drop of rain, every budding tulip, every blade of grass — all of them are gifts with a Person attached."

The Return of the HAM SUPPER

Like a "well oiled machine", the members and friends of the Middleburgh Reformed Church put on another successful Ham Supper on Saturday, Nov. 10th. In the aftermath of the "Flood of Hurricane Irene", we decided to forego a supper in 2011 and concentrate our efforts on helping our friends and neighbors with the personal recovery of their homes and businesses.

The decision to continue with **the Ham Supper** for this year was an easy one for us. It has become an important part of our church life. We knew that there would be some extra expenses added to this year's supper budget, as we needed to replace some items lost in the flood, but with faith we went ahead. We gratefully accepted the gift of some used tables from the Schoharie Presbyterian Church and we borrowed more from our own church members. We borrowed coffee pots and large trays from local Fire Departments and had a very successful "Kitchen Shower" to replace baskets, silverware, hot drink carafes and a rolling kitchen cart. I want to thank everyone who purchased or helped to obtain those items for us.

So, with a new table floor plan for our Fellowship Hall and many new friends to help, we served 565 dinners in 3 hours. With over 70 workers, who cooked, cleaned, sliced, scooped, served and washed, we were a happy crew as we went about our tasks. Many of our guests remarked at how they missed the supper last year and they were so glad that we were continuing the annual event. Our sanctuary was all lit up and, while still a work in progress, many guests were impressed with what they saw. Our efforts, first to rebuild and now to refinish our place of worship, did not go unnoticed. We should all be very proud of what we have done there, so far.

As this year's Ham Supper Chairman, I would like to thank all those who donated food items for the supper. Thank you to Barber's Farm for the squash and potatoes. Thank you to the potato bakers for supplying the butter and sour cream, and to the pie bakers for all those delicious pies!

you to all the committee Chairpersons who helped to get the workers organized and ready to bake or work. And to all those who showed up on Saturday with warm smiles and willing hands, a simple 'thank you' is never enough. We called. You came. That is what being a church family is all about. 
