We have a favorite litany in our house. It goes something like this:

"Can I have some juice?"

"Sure, just a second..."

"I want some juice."

"Yes, please wait."

Please wait. This refrain is repeated a lot in our home. It does not take long for the girls to become antsy to have their request fulfilled. I used to think it takes years of experience to nurture an aversion to waiting. Yet, in our clinical trials it's been confirmed that it takes just a few months of living and no training to complain about waiting Even though our girls are full of sweetness and light, sometimes they don't like waiting. Ok, they never like waiting. It shouldn't have surprised me that they furrowed their brows when they heard about the season of Advent.

The word Advent comes from the Latin meaning "arrival" or "coming." The season challenges us to wait. It asks us to intentionally experience waiting. The waiting cuts in three directions: *Past, Future, and Present.* We remember how Israel anticipated the Messiah. Some did it well. Many did not. In either case, the Lord unrolled history to reveal the long awaited son. Today we wait for the future second coming of Christ. (see page 4)

Thank you Fellowship Committee. Soon we will be home!

Salvation has come and yet is still coming.

The struggle to wait reveals our discontented hearts. It can be boring and we take up with other things. Distractions offer temporary relief from the anxiety and disappointment that comes with waiting. The temporary becomes regular and then eventually permanent. The seasons can come and go around us and we never deal with what is right in front of us: our own need for God. This is not a new challenge. The Apostle Paul wrote a letter, Thessalonians, to a people who were tired of waiting for Christ to come back. This is the first letter we have and dates to about 54 AD. Jesus had not been in heaven much more than 20 years before and they were already getting lazy about waiting. When people get lazy they get sloppy. And they were doing some sloppy-living. Paul writes to encourage them to keep watch. "So then let us not sleep, as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober." (1 Thess 5:6).

Today, in our community and church we are waiting for things to be normal again. We are waiting for what we were used to. We say that the buildings and traditions and routines are not our life. But we are now thrust into the middle of a great experiment of whether this was true. And this is an even greater mercy. Underneath that yearning the Lord is calling us closer to Him: *please wait*.

Our worship services and life together during this season is different, and it might be a challenge. Let us draw close to what we are really waiting for: God's presence with us.

Here are some suggestions to help you actively wait during this chaotic season:

Pray. We may address the king of the universe with our requests. And he would like to speak to us! Speak the Lord, be silent and ask Him what he wants to say to us.

Read: Scripture- take a passage and read it slowly a couple of times- asking the Holy Spirit to guide you.

Slow down: It's ok to say no if it makes more space for life. Sit in silence for 5 minuets a day, mindful of the Lord's presence.

Ask Questions: What are my longings? What do you want God to do in your life? Your family? In the community? In the world? How has the love of God changed you? What are you doing to prepare for Christ and his coming this season?

Shop Mindfully: be mindful how we shop to fulfill longings to please ourselves and fulfilled false expectations in others. Remember the poor.

We look forward to what God has in store for us this season. Each of you are in my prayers. I especially pray that you'll know how deep and wide the love of God is for you in this time.
