We begin another year with hearts full of gratitude for the Lord's faithfulness in the past year. Before my sabbatical last May I was challenged by this verse: The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. (Phil 4). Many believe Paul is naïve and inexperienced in the way of worry. Worry, people say, is relieved through distraction, or by getting a new and larger perspective. And these can be good and helpful things. But there is more available. The remedy, Paul says, is to give thanks while asking God for what we need. Both together. I was worried heading into the summer for my sabbatical. I wondered if I prepared enough, if I talked enough about it, and what I was forgetting. I had to work at it, but I eventually prayed. I prayed that people would be cared for. I prayed for our guest pastor Lynn. I prayed that people would step into new roles of service and leadership with courage. And now, unless I missed something, I think we can all say together that the Lord blessed the time. He gave each of us what we needed. People learned more and were challenged to share their gifts. The time was really good and the benefits are still being felt today. We are also looking ahead with expectation. We have been engaged with the Ridder Church Renewal process. It is simply a process and series of values and skills to facilitate corporate and personal transformation. Through this process and the continued faithfulness of each of you we sense that God is affirming the church's life and ministry together. This work has led us to work on developing a mission and vision statement. I am the first to admit I was reluctant to do this. But if we did our work well, we will be able to see the church and ourselves in the statement. That is- it should feel like it fits even as it challenges us. So we are excited to share what we have come up with:

As the body of Christ, the mission of the Middleburgh Reformed Church is to demonstrate the transformative message of Jesus Christ. Our vision is that we will grow as disciples through prayer, worship, education and service.

We look forward to learning what this means and looks like. I think it affirms many of the things we do well and enjoy doing, while also opening up possibilities for things that we want to try again or new ways of being church together. Our journey will be like swinging: we need to lean back to move forward. We lean back on what God has given us and who we are; and then kick forward. And it becomes joy. We have nothing to loose because we already have it in Christ.

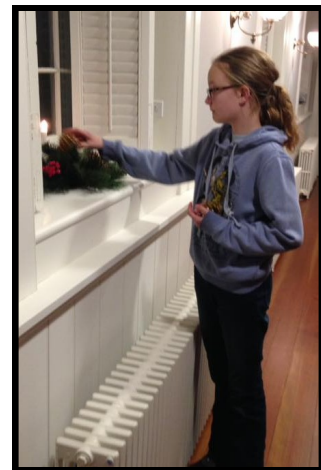

Since the last newsletter, the Property Committee has continued to meet once a month to discuss and decide on various property issues. Thank you to the committee: Arleen, Aaron, Richard, Leslie and Property Caretaker Doug Kingsbury.

Last spring, one of the big trees on the front lawn died and needed to come down. Thank you to church members who helped with the clean up. There are still many trees as evidenced by the huge pile of leaves which must be removed each fall with help from the boy scouts. A major project in July was the repair and painting of the bell tower on our 230 year old church. Dimensions North was contracted to repair the extensive insect and weather damage and to do the painting. Doug Kingsbury completed the work on the sanctuary windows—a project that took many hours over each of three summers.

In 2016, the MRC fellowship hall was used 234 days by several groups for a variety of activities. There were many days when there were multiple users. The building use policy requires each user of the facilities to clean up after their activity so it will be ready for the next group. While this plan looks good on paper, the end result is not

always satisfactory which has led to increased cleaning for the property caretaker. Church workdays in the spring and fall have had low turnout leaving additional tasks to be completed by the property caretaker.

For the last two years, volunteers have signed up to clean the church sanctuary. The Property Committee is proposing a plan which involves volunteers cleaning some additional areas of the building such as the foyer, nursery, classrooms and kitchen. These volunteers would be able to choose the time that best fits their busy schedules so they can clean the area they have chosen. The property caretaker would be responsible for cleaning all tile floors, foyer floors, bath-

rooms, windows, screens and siding. Yard work can also be done by volunteers on days they choose rather than on an “official” church work day.

The property caretaker duties and responsibilities include much more than cleaning. Building maintenance, minor repairs, sidewalks, safety, comfort and meeting with those who use the buildings are also part of the job description. The volunteer cleaning proposal could help with cleaning costs, but if we are not able to do this, then we need to spend additional money to have it done or accept that everything may not get done.

We welcome anyone who would like to be part of the Property Committee.

Relay Center

In 2016, MRC served as an OCC drop-off site for the eighth year. Volunteers from Second Reformed of Howes Cave, Schoharie Reformed, Our Lady of the Valley, and our own church family greeted donors, received gifts, and “cartonized” shoeboxes. 1,503 shoeboxes were delivered by 28 churches, some individuals, and community organizations. Members of Boy Scout Troop 2 hefted the shoebox-filled shipping cartons onto a truck (AKA sleigh) provided by Barber’s Farm. “Santa Cindy” and Mary Lou delivered them to the collection center on Nov. 20. Brian De-Feo and Stan Roesler made a “clean-up run” to the collection center with the shoeboxes that came in on Nov. 21, the last day of the collection.

This report could be the standard year-end report, the number of clients who used the food pantry, and the year-end balance in the check book. Instead, I hope this narrative will help you understand the work of the food pantry.

First, thank you to all the volunteers and substitutes who sit in the food pantry on Wednesdays or Saturdays waiting for clients to arrive. Sometimes it is busy, other times very quiet. You volunteers are great to work with. Someone always steps up to help cover the hours that the food pantry is open. One volunteer, who was going away for Christmas, was afraid she might get sick. She asked me to arrange for people she could call to cover for her, just in case.

Second, thank you to all the

churches, civic organizations, and individuals who donate food and/or money. Between monetary donations and grants we certainly have the resources to keep serving clients. It is very easy for me to order bulk quantities from the Regional Food Bank and get cases of food at one time. However, I think about the donor who puts together a bag containing a box of pasta, a jar of tomato sauce, a can of fruit, a can of vegetables, and a box of cereal. That donor is trying to help one person at a time.

Third, it may seem strange to say thank you to our clients, but as the clients come in for food they also open up and talk. We are not therapists but we listen and many times it helps us understand who uses the food pantry. Clients tell us about high energy bills,

medical problems and bills, temporary loss of jobs, marital problems, spousal losses that reduce benefits, and just not enough income to cover basic needs. When we hear these stories we realize how lucky we are and that there is real need in our community.

The food pantry is open Wednesday 4 to 6, and Saturday 9 to 11, also by appointment. We are staffed by volunteers from the Huntersland Methodist Church, the Middleburgh Methodist Church, Our Lady of the Valley, Middleburgh Pilgrim Holiness Church, and the Middleburgh Reformed Church. We receive donations from all of these churches as well as Rotary, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, the Postal food drive, and individuals. We will continue to operate as long as there is a need.

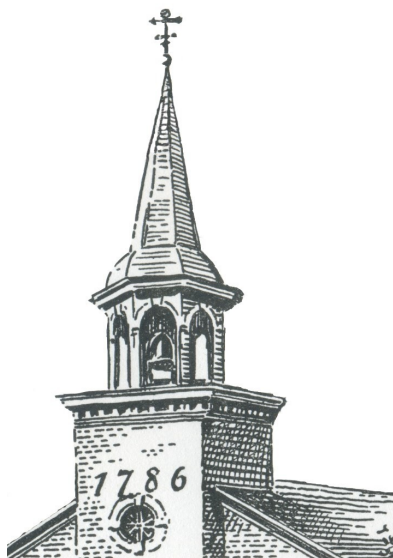
