MRC News

Writing a note about looking back is always difficult. So much of our energy is directed toward planning and looking ahead and we don't take enough time to remember. God also calls us to remember each Sabbath, to stop and recognize again who is in charge. Songwriters in the Psalms often follow up their troubles by retelling God's faithfulness (e.g. Psalm 143). When Jesus gave us the bread and the cup to help us remember he looked ahead to the Cross. We look back to his death as the defining moment for our success in life, and we are relieved of the burden of thinking it's all up to us. We remember so we can look ahead. It's not with a steely optimism, but with realism and hope. Realism in that we can say what is true. Hope in that the wrongs are made right in Christ. So we fix our minds on 'things above' as the true story of life (Colossians 3).

This past year has been significant in a couple ways. A year ago we were looking forward to the beginning of my three-month sabbatical. As a church, we did more than survive- we learned and thrived. In the past year we've prayed with the sick, mourned the passing of friends, shared generously with each other and others, and welcomed new friends. As a way to celebrate and mark the year, we are gathering Sunday, June 11th at the Timothy Murphy Park 11 am- 2pm. We plan on eating and playing, and giving thanks for God's goodness.

We are also looking ahead in our lives together as we continue to learn about how God has made us and where God is leading. The Ridder Team recently completed their last retreat. For the last five years Mary Lou Ryan, Sarah Bramer and Joel Bramer have put a lot of time and effort into learning about congregational change. Their work isn't done, but we owe them a great deal of thanks. If you have a moment, ask them what they are learning.

Two fundamental convictions have come out of Ridder: (1) it's a process not a project or program. This is not about knowing more or doing more- it's about who we are individually and as a group. And (2) who we are is determined by our own personal journey. So, if we want the people we are a part of to be different (church, family, group, etc), we ourselves have to be different. It's not 'their' problem to fix, but it's my challenge to wonder about. So, we'll be wondering together. What does wholeness look like for us, the church, the community and so on? We'll be hosting some different sessions this Summer and Fall. Consider coming and discovering how you are being called into wholeness in Christ. Our youngest students, in pre-K-1st grade were invited to *Imagine*. They imagined what it meant to be a part of God's family, what it would be like to follow God's directions and finally, what it was like when people first met Jesus. This group was led by Sarah Bramer.

The 2nd and 3rd graders were encouraged to *Wonder*. They wondered about God's amazing plan for us, His daring mission, and about the amazing power of Jesus. Lara Kelley led the kids in

this group.

Joel Bramer and the 3rd-4th graders took time to *Marvel*. They marveled at God's love and mercy.

The 6th—8th graders started to *Dive* a little deeper. Led by Kim Smith, they talked about topics like justice and stewardship. They also began to look at their spiritual gifts (just as we were encouraged to do a year ago).

Jeff and the older youth held weekly discussions on topics that they are facing in their every day lives. One such discussion was based on science vs. faith and what to do when what they are taught in school contradicts what we learn from the Bible. The new curriculum is still challenging at times, but we work to make it real and accessible to our students.

With the help of Devral Watson, we completed more "nosew" blankets for Project Linus this year. The children's weekly offerings totaled more than \$300 this year and we will be helping them decide how they can put it to good use for God's glory.

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News from the History-Genealogy Room by Marian Lynes-Bouck

A recent article in the Schenectady Gazette caught my attention, as the headline read. "Niskayuna Reformed Church to showcase history". An illustration featured a 1791 document discovered by the Church History and Archives committee of that church when cleaning out the parish. They avow the formation of their parish as 1750s. Our Middleburgh church is known to have appealed to neighboring church for aid in the building of the 1786 church after the devastating 1780 raid on the valley by Johnson & Brant. Was the Niskayuna church one of them? Our early Consistory minutes might give us that information!

Our archives have been revisited and labeled to make it easy for a new committee and chairman to discover the tremendous collection of historic papers. We have many hand-written papers, some in Dutch, which show the first pastor was called to our church in 1731!

Our collection remains in archival boxes and (in most cases) on carts with the plan for a quick transfer to the attic in case of flood warnings. With the amount of mitigation in the Schoharie Creek and its tributaries, it seems a most unlikely scenario. But we know firsthand that the possibility remains. I will be happy to help in a transition to a new chairman or group of persons who wish to take over the archives. It's a great job! Gathering today's news and activities makes tomorrow's history!



Stewarding Today and Tomorrow: Invested Funds by Pastor Jeff

Our congregation has been given many good things to steward. Part of our story in the last two decades has been funds set aside for specific uses. The invested funds are just one way that we have the chance to invest in God's Kingdom, both today and in the future. Like any *thing*, they can be a false sense of security and distraction. However, we have been blessed by these invested

funds, as they have provided for many unexpected expenses. After the recent flood, it allowed for us to clean up and recover the use of our property. Last year they paid for much needed steeple repairs and maintenance. They also helped in paying for the organ repairs (see related story). During leaner seasons (like the summer months) they help cover the gap in giving. Funds include the Billy Brown Fund that was

established in memory of Billy Brown to support sending children to camp. The Flood Insurance fund was set up a few years ago to aid in cleanup after future flooding of the property. The Memorial Fund is made up of gifts in memory of folks, including the recent annual Remembrance Tree (see in the back of the sanctuary for the names). Recently, the Doerge Memorial fund was created in memory of Henry for his passion of supporting our local church (not included in the table). Fennimore Asset Management generously manages the investments for us. 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Property Committee by Leslie Hooper

The January 2017 newsletter property committee report started with the news that in spring 2016, we had to take down a big tree on the front lawn. Well... on May 18, 2017 the wind took down a bigger tree on the back lawn. Thankfully no one was hurt and there was only minor damage to the storage shed. The other big trees on the property will need to be inspected for potential problems.

We are blessed to have a beautiful facility on a very pretty piece of property, both of which require attention on a regular basis. A plan was proposed to have volunteers "adopt" some rooms to clean and do yard work on their own schedule rather than on designated work days. These efforts have been helpful. Our Property Caretaker, Doug Kingsbury, did sidewalk snow removal, stripped and waxed all the tile floors and cleared much of the fallen tree in addition to general cleaning and maintenance. Keeping our building and grounds in good condition is a shared responsibility.

Projects to be addressed by the Property committee in the near future include; repair to the church sign, painting the exterior wood trim on the fellowship hall, work on the storage shed, replacing some shingles on the sanctuary roof and installing shelving in classroom # 1. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to share their time and talents on any of these projects. Anyone who would like to get involved with property issues, is invited to join the Property Committee.

Many gifts have already been purchased for our 2017 packing party. We are currently collecting hygiene items: soap, washcloths, toothbrushes, and combs. 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Food Pantry Report by Russ Ryan

The food pantry continues to operate from our church. It is run by volunteers from all the area churches and civic organizations. These same people donate their time, monetary gifts, and food items to the pantry.

The pantry is open Wednesdays, 4-6, and Saturdays 9-11. Clients may also call and arrange a time if they are unable to come at our regular times. So far from July 2016 (the beginning of our HPNAP Grant) to April 2017 we have served 569 people. These clients are mainly from the Middleburgh area, so our work is a local mission.

The food pantry relies on support from the community in the form of monetary, food donations, and, personal time. As of right now the pantry is doing well in all areas. 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A special Note:

Dear Members of the Middleburgh Reformed Church.

As many of you may know I recently had a trip to an organ console SPA. My trip started on February 1st when Sid (the local organ guy) came to Middleburgh and cut all the wires between me and the pipes (it didn't hurt). I was then lovingly carried down the stairs by gentlemen of the church. They were very gentle, especially on the turn in the stairwell. I was crated up and left on February 3rd for Chicago.

It was a cold trip in the back of a truck. I even spent two nights in a shipping distribution center. I finally arrived in Chicago on Tuesday, February 7th.

The next ten weeks brought great changes to my internal works. I received two new keyboards, a new pedal board, and new combination action. The new combination action kept the eight generals for



my full organ and added six generals for my swell manual and six generals for my great manual. With new technology there are six levels of memory so I really have sixty four generals for full organ and thirty six generals for each manual. I am now in the 21st Century.

With the new keyboards and pedal board all the internal wiring had to be replaced, including the 1946 lamp wire that went from the on/off switch to the main power supply. The old paper insulation was a fire hazard. This new wiring is connected to plastic connectors that match up with new plastic connectors coming from the organ chamber.

I was crated up in Chicago and sent by UPS freight back to Middleburgh. I arrived on April 25th and was carried back upstairs on the 26th. Thank you to all the men who carried me down in February and back up in April. Sid spent Wednesday and Friday attaching wires from the organ chamber to the new plastic connectors. I was playable and on Sunday, April 30th I was used again as part of the church service.

Now that I am back, Russ will have to get used to all my new features. Please keep in mind, nothing was changed in the organ chamber, all the work was strictly mechanical, no pipes were altered. I am still a pipe organ, some of my pipes date back to the original 1886 organ, others date from an 1895 organ update. Other ranks of pipes date to a 1946 and a 1983 renovation.

I am glad to be back. More importantly, I am glad to be updated with all the new features. I am also glad that everything works. Russ has a lot of practicing to do to get used to all my added features.

Thank you for my stay at the SPA. I am ready for many more years of service.

PS: Did you know that at the end of June 2017, Russ will have served as organist at MRC for 40 years?!


